SUMMARY OF THE DEPOSIT PORTFOLIO

As at December 31, 2018, the caisse's member deposits totalled \$514,941K, up \$29,215K, or 6.0%, year over year. Deposits made by individual members provide the main source of funding for the caisse's expansion. These deposits represent 79.1% of total deposits as at December 31, 2018.
